Celebrate the notion of giving and kindness on the streets of Auckland CBD from Friday 9 – Saturday 17 April 2010 with an exciting programme of live performance art, and moving image that brings together local and international artists and choreographers.

Living Room 2010 is a free Auckland City Council event curated around the theme of surrealist artist Max Ernst's book of collage, 'Un Semaine de Bonte', from which this year's event derives its name: 'A Week of Goodness'.

PHIL DADSON (NEW ZEALAND)

Saturday 10th April, 11am – 12.30pm

Phil Dadson is an award winning sound and media artist, composer, performer and instrument builder who will talk about his project 'Urban Devas', created for Living Room 2010. He will also run a short interactive workshop based around the music routines of the project.

Phil is a fulltime artist, whose practice includes solo sound and intermedia performances and installations, music compositions, graphic scores, video and short film, sound sculptures, and improvisations on his instruments. Phil was the founder of New Zealand's most avant-garde performance groups, *From Scratch*. He tours extensively throughout New Zealand and internationally.

PAULA ROUSH (UK)

Paula Roush is an interdisciplinary artist, researcher and teacher, whose work addresses public culture and urban space. Paula works with a city as a site of investigation and develops ways of intervening in urban space, working in the mode of public art and tactical intervention into public debate. In 1988 she founded msdm, a platform for art research whose projects reveal her interest for mobile strategies of display and mediation, the convergence of network practices and daily life.

Paula will talk about her work and her project for Living Room, a performative installation consisting of live (web) drawing re-enacting sections of Max Ernst's *Semaine de Bonte* book.

MARK HARVEY AND SEAN CURHAM (NEW ZEALAND)

Mark Harvey is a performance artist, choreographer and writer. He lectures at the University of Auckland in dance and interdisciplinary arts related practice and theory. He has presented work in a range of local and international contexts, including: the Govett Brewster Art Gallery; the Parnu International Video and Film Festival, Estonia 2006; Camp X, Denmark 2008; and was awarded 'Most Dedicated Artist' for his performances at the Blue Oyster Gallery, Dunedin Fringe Festival 2006.

Sean Curham has an ever-changing practice - movement and performance in the broadest sense continue to be of interest. His most recent works include: *Speedy legs, slow arms - speedy arms, slow legs* at Glitch, Auckland in 2009; *One* an event which Sean both curated and performed as part of the Heritage Festival, Auckland 2009; and *Four Legs Better Than Two*, a 'dog walking' art in the community work created as an Otago University Fellow in 2009, which will be presented in Sydney in 2011. Sean is currently developing *She's a Sensation*, a suite of new works, with the support of Creative New Zealand.

Choreographers Sean Curham and Mark Harvey will talk about their own work practice, and the collaborative process of working with invited Living Room artists et al. and Isobel Dryburgh.

LILIBETH CUENCA RASMUSSEN (DENMARK)

Wednesday 14th April, 11am – 12pm

Recipient of the Eckersberg Medal of Honor in 2008 and chosen as 'Artist of the Year' in Denmark 2006, Lilibeth Cuenca Rasmussen works primarily in video and performance art. Taking her own Danish-Filipino background as a point of departure, Cuenca gathers, adapts, and universalizes her narratives in both a critical and humorous approach in regards to issues such as identity, culture, religion, gender and social relations. Her work has been presented internationally at institutions including: Malmo Kunst Museum, Sweden; Museum of Contemporary Art Seoul, South Korea; and at the Tate Modern, London. Lilibeth will talk about her international multi-media performance work and her collaboration with NZ choreographer, Charles Koroneho on her project for Living Room, *The Future is already way behind the Present doesn't exist in my Mind...*

URBAN DEVAS

Phil Dadson and Carol Brown have collaborated to create, *Urban Devas*. In this piece a roving chorus inhabits a series of civic spaces within the central business district of Auckland through body movement, voice and sonic props. Informed by Max Ernst's graphic novel an artist's book *Une Semaine de Bonté* (A Week of Kindness), these performers appear as surreal figures – devas - between reality and myth - who occupy spaces in-between and in the gaps and cavities of dominant civic spaces. Arriving unannounced and 'out of the blue' at pre-determined times and places, they perform short choreographic interventions (tableaux vivant; sculptural moves) and loud, sonic interjections that resonate through the public site.

THE FUTURE IS ALREADY WAY BEHIND THE PRESENT DOESN'T EXIST IN MY MIND...

(note: artists will be rehearsing in the Square in the days leading up to this event)

A performance inspired by the writings of Valentine de Saint-Point and Mina Loy that reflects on lust, romanticized sexuality, and the subjugation of women. Collaborating with composers Pete Drungle and Brian Bender, motion graphic artist Brian Close, costume designer Lise Klitten, Cuenca Rasmussen merges choreography, song, architecture and costume in a multi-media performance.

New Zealand choreographer Charles Koroneho is working in collaboration with Lilibeth Cuenca Rasmussen to re-contextualize the performance *The Future is already way behind the Present doesn't exist in my Mind...* The new work will be presented in collaboration with production designer Brad Gledhill, utilizing the existing Cuenca Rasmussen performance and incorporating production and design elements created specifically for Saint Patrick's Square.



THE COLLECTION III

The third and final installment of a three part performance series by Wellington based artist Sarah Jane Parton, *The Collection (III)* will feature multiple elements that shape a non-linear narrative about tomorrow.*

Incorporating a large ensemble cast performing a series of seemingly unrelated, but ultimately inter-related, movements and actions, *The Collection (III)* will be a tragi-comical take on everything and nothing, on hope and despair, on dreams and failure. Set in an arctic-tropic urban middle-space, it will be a dysfunctional model for a harmonious future that is both familiar and disconcerting.

The Collection (I) took place in August 2009 on Nikao Beach in Rarotonga, with a delayed broadcast to Victoria University's Adam Art Gallery. It was swiftly followed the next month by *The Collection (II)*, which was organised by The Physics Room in Christchurch's Mona Vale Fernery.

BEIGE

In *Beige* dancers perform in an almost trance like state, physically connected by their DIY beige costume that warps haphazardly around the dancers bodies to make a strange bodysuit. Each dancers' movement affects the others, creating a clumsiness and a cause and effect within the group. The colour of the costume echos the palette of the urban environment. They move as one to the hypnotic rhythm of a song like an organism and a primary school dance troupe gone wrong. A NIGHT OF GOODNESS

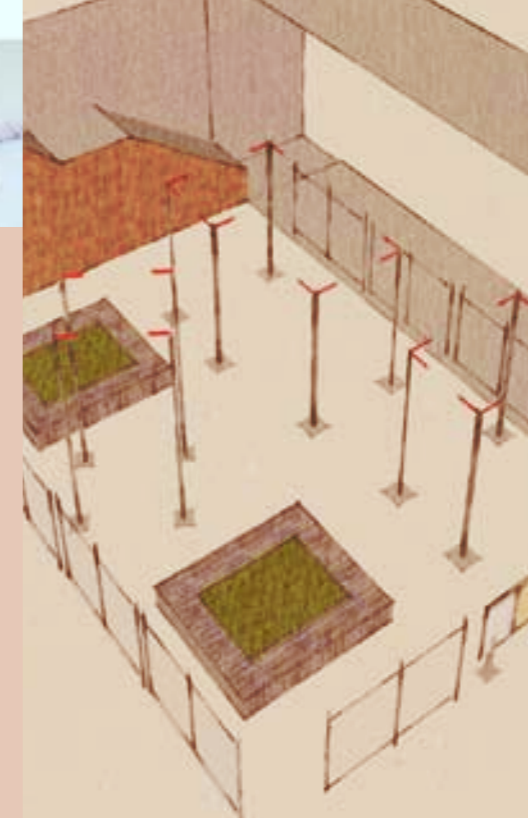

A performance created and performed by dance graduates and students, exploring the theme for Living Room 2010, *A Week of Goodness*, using ideas gathered from working with Lilibeth Cuenca Rasmussen and Charles Koroneho. Saint Patrick's Square will host a new expression of collaboration and emergent performance making in *A Night of Goodness; dance, music and design*.



ONE-TO-MANY AND MANY-TO-ONE

Location: Khartoum Place, between Lorne Street and Kitchener Street, beside the Auckland Art Gallery

Sean Curham et al. seek to define a space for exchange without expectation of specific benefits in return, but where motivation in itself can make the difference between 'good' and 'bad'. The project explores issues of altruism and reciprocity as expressed through actions of 'good' purpose. Motivations for individual and social giving, and the manifestations of unselfish concern for others is a core aspect of loyalty and duty. In public good experiments, behavioral economists have demonstrated that the potential for reciprocal actions by individuals increases the rate of contribution to the public good, providing evidence for the importance of reciprocity in social situations.



A FIELD OF INTERCONNECTED REALITIES

A field of interconnected realities is a performative installation consisting of live drawing re-enacting sections of the *Semaine de Bonte* book, leading to the production of an artist's publication.

Two artists in different locations collaborate through webcam in the development of an interconnected drawing inspired in revised bio-tech versions of Max Ernst's 1934 collages. Each session is performed live, mixing hand drawing with the use of sketch-a-graph, a machine that can both enlarge and reduce an image whilst copying it and is networked with webcams and streamed live on the net and projected at QE11 Square.

After the performance the audience will be invited to participate and experiment drawing using the sketch-o-graph.

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
